24-7 YOUTH WORK

Building relationships, through friendship and trust, is the key to successful youth work and here in Ashburton we are very lucky to have a group of passionate youth workers at both Ashburton Intermediate School and Ashburton College.

From beginnings 20 years ago, 24-7 Youth Work has grown to be a nationwide organisation that is based on a relationship of trust between local churches and schools and has been running in Ashburton since 2016. Our four local youth workers each work an average of 10 hours a week, spending their time with students in the playground, in class, and supporting other school activities and events.

Sadly, we keep hearing that NZ has high rates of youth suicide and mental health issues such as depression and anxiety. 24-7 Youth Work believe that young New Zealanders need more time, more listening and more encouragement. Team

leader, Lisa Anderson says, “This requires an approach based on relationships, not programmes and this is what our youth workers are offering”.

The youth workers help the school and staff by giving students extra support, providing time and relationships at a very influential age. They engage not only with troubled kids, but with all young people at the schools, supporting them to help deal with their issues.

The passion of our youth workers to help individuals is inspiring, and the stories they share give a real sense of the difference they are making to the students in our community.

Ashburton Intermediate Principal, Brent Gray says, “It’s about building a rapport

and working collaboratively to help both our youth and our community”.

EXPERT HELP FOR CHILDREN WITH LEARNING DIFFICULTIES

Children in the Ashburton district with undiagnosed learning disabilities such as dyslexia, are benefiting from a new Advance Ashburton initiative thanks to the generosity of a local couple.

The financial barrier to obtaining an assessment has been removed now that an outreach branch of the Seabrook McKenzie Centre for Specific Learning Disabilities has opened in Ashburton. This service is offering assessments to students referred by their school principal with the fee being covered by Advance Ashburton upon the application being approved by the Mid Canterbury Principals Association.

Thanks to the generosity of a local family, who have their own close connection to dyslexia, the programme was able to be initiated in May this year. This service provides a two-tiered learning disability

assessment by a specialist who determines if the student may need tutoring, language or occupational therapy, or glasses.

It is estimated that ten percent of children have a specific learning disability, but professional assessments can cost up to \$500 each. Since the initiative commenced a significant number of children have already been assessed.

The Centre's Trustee Eleanor Marr said, "It will make a huge difference for these children."

"Primarily it's about linking patients with services available in our community. Where there are broader social issues, such as poverty or family violence, for example, we give wrap-around support to ensure the best outcome for the patient," says Julie. +

BUDGETING ADVISORY CONTINUES

For nearly twenty-five years, the Ashburton Budget Advisory Service has helped thousands of people with budgeting advice and education.

The service was wound up in late 2016, and its accumulated funds were transferred to Advance Ashburton Community Foundation where a named fund was created.

Income from this fund is now available to support the budget advisory services provided by Presbyterian Support in the Ashburton District.

Su Hutchison, Services Manager for Presbyterian Support in Ashburton, reports that money worries can drag people down and can often link in with feelings of anxiety and depression. However, if time is put into organising finances, this can have a long-term benefit to many aspects of people's lives.

The Budget Advisory Service offers one-on-one sessions with a trained financial

mentor, who assists individuals, couples or families experiencing financial hardship to develop a day-to-day and longer-term plan. In Ashburton there is one full time, one part-time, and four volunteer financial mentors.

UNLOCK YOUR WELLBEING

In June 2016, the greater Canterbury Community Response Forum together with the Ashburton mayor released the Ashburton Community Report.

This report highlighted key social issues, needs, gaps in services and opportunities for further action in our district. From this report the Hauora plan was developed to improve wellbeing in the Ashburton community.

From collaboration of community groups with government agencies and non-government organisations, it is hoped to bring about large scale social change from better cross-sector coordination rather than isolated interventions of individual organisations. There are three priority social and wellbeing areas for the district: safety,

connectedness, and health and wellbeing. The Health and Wellbeing workstream of the Hauora Ashburton District Plan is contributing to youth wellbeing resiliency promotion and awareness with the provision of a free workshop, which coincides with Mental Health Awareness week. The theme is "Youth Wellbeing and Resiliency".

Key note speakers include Dr Sue Bagshaw from the Christchurch 298 Youth Health

Services, and David Cairns, co-ordinator for Pegasus Health – both of whom have vast experience in youth mental health and the issues faced.


HELIPAD

Christchurch Hospital is New Zealand's busiest trauma centre but remains the only major hospital without a rooftop helipad. Currently seriously ill patients land in Hagley Park. It then takes on average thirteen minutes to transfer the patient to the hospital.

Approximately 150 Mid-Canterbury patients are transferred from within Mid-Canterbury to Christchurch Hospital every year.

The rooftop helipad will provide a much quicker transition to full patient care and reduce patient stress. To achieve the best outcome for the patient "time is a critical factor we have control over and can reduce", says Dr David Bowie, an Intensive Care specialist and the Clinical Director of the Air Retrieval Service.

This future-proofed helipad will have a significant positive benefit for our district. Advance Ashburton was pleased to donate \$50,000 from the Ashburton Health and Hospital Fund to the Māia Health Foundation, contributing towards the \$2.2m total to be raised by end of 2018. ✦
