AUCTION OF UNIQUE ART COLLECTION BOOSTS ARTS FUND

Over the past fifty years, the Braided Rivers Community Trust (formerly the Ashburton Licensing Trust) amassed a significant art collection. The forty paintings in the collection were mostly acquired as the winning works from the Ashburton Art Awards which were sponsored by the Ashburton Licensing Trust (ALT).

For many years, these paintings were displayed in the properties owned by the ALT, including the Hotel Ashburton. However, in recent years, the operations of the Trust changed, and many properties were sold, leaving the current Braided Rivers Community Trust (BRCT) with a substantial art collection in storage.

In February this year, the Board of BRCT formally gifted eight paintings of cultural significance to the Ashburton community which will be retained in the Ashburton Art Gallery collection. The remaining paintings were formally gifted to Advance Ashburton Community Foundation to auction for the Ashburton Arts Fund. In April, Advance Ashburton held an auction of the paintings from the ALT collection as well as a number generously donated by members of our community. A large crowd attended the event at the Ashburton Society of Arts Short Street Studio where all sixty-three lots sold under the hammer of auctioneer, Hamish Niles. This yielded a significant boost to the Arts Fund with \$38,000 raised from the auction.

The Ashburton Arts Fund was established by Advance Ashburton in 2016 with an initial donation of \$1,000 from the Ashburton District Council. Held in perpetuity by Advance Ashburton, the income generated by the Fund will be distributed through grants to support art and artists in the Ashburton District.

Renowned artist, author, and illustrator, David Elliot, is the Ambassador of the Ashburton Arts Fund and was the special guest on auction night. Elliot was born and raised in Ashburton. After graduating from Canterbury Art School in 1976, he worked both as a designer and teacher before becoming a full-time writer and illustrator in 1998. He has since gained international recognition in this field and has won many awards.

The potential of the Arts Fund to support local artists is welcomed by David Elliot. He has had first-hand experience of the difficulties faced by those working in the visual arts. "Finance is always a problem, especially for those just starting out in their careers, so I wholeheartedly support the Ashburton Arts Fund and its objective to support individuals and projects in its artistic community," said Elliot. "Over the years, I have watched the township grow substantially in vibrancy and diversity. Initiatives like the Ashburton Arts Fund can only continue to enhance that growth and, through it, the quality of life for all." +

The key focus of the volunteer committee has always been to allow all school-age children an opportunity to learn water safety and allow the community affordable access to a local family-friendly pool. Three local schools, Mt Hutt College, Methven Primary School and Our Lady of the Snows, all benefit from the pool's locality.

The Methven Community Pool was opened in 1929, and enlarged during a reconstruction in 1966. The facility has two outdoor heated pools, a regular 33m pool and a learners' pool. Annually around 1000 students and key holders use the facility with about 800 students benefitting from "Learn to Swim" lessons or swimming squads. Locally, sports clubs also use the facilities for training purposes. **+**
